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2018 CEW Scholars: Fiona David and Anna Leibel head to MIT Sloan

Chief Executive Women (CEW) announce the winners of two scholarships to study innovation at one of the world's top business schools, MIT Sloan in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Fiona David, inaugural Research Chair of the Minderoo Foundation and Anna Leibel, Chief Information Officer at UniSuper will attend the *Driving Strategic Innovation* program at MIT in September this year.

The winners

Fiona David is inaugural Research Chair of the Minderoo Foundation, a philanthropic organisation established in 2001 by Andrew and Nicola Forrest with a mandate to support initiatives that focus on some of society's most pressing challenges.

A lawyer and criminologist, Fiona has worked for more than twenty years at the intersection of research and human rights. Her role at the Minderoo Foundation is to work with the leadership team to deliver a coherent and robust research program that informs and enables the achievement of the Foundation's diverse outcomes.

"Incremental change is not an option when the challenges you are talking about are modern slavery, loss of food supply due to over-fishing, or lethal forms of cancer. We have to find ways of achieving major social breakthroughs, so we can all enjoy a world that is safer, healthier, more just and humane."

"For us to create lasting, positive change we need to think and act very differently. Innovation is a verb not a noun - and the MIT course is focused on how to live and work like that every day."

Anna Leibel is Chief Information Officer for UniSuper, one of Australia's largest super funds with over \$69 billion in net funds under management. Her role is to deliver a new IT strategy that prioritises the member and employer experience, modernises the way the fund brings value to its members and employers and keeps information secure and safe. Anna's cross-

industry career spans more than two decades in transformation programs, management consulting and technology start-ups, and she has held senior consulting and general management roles with PwC, Telstra and NAB.

“The Australian superannuation industry is ripe for disruption, be it through legislative change, the challenge of engaging the wider population in their super or the speed at which technology is emerging. Innovation will be a crucial differentiator now and in the future.

“The MIT scholarship will help me better engage with stakeholders to demonstrate the value of harnessing technology and innovation to improve the member and employer experience and drive business growth.”

The scholarship

The scholarships will enable Fiona and Anna to attend the *Driving Strategic Innovation* program at MIT Sloan in September this year.

Driving Strategic Innovation is a joint program between MIT Sloan and IMD that brings together the latest technology research from MIT Sloan and the latest leadership knowledge from IMD. The program provides participants with the opportunity to learn how to manage innovation within their organisations. It knits together innovation, marketing and product development, business model opportunities, value-chain design, project execution and talent management in an end-to-end roadmap for achieving breakthrough performance.

The scholarships are part of the 2018 CEW Scholars program, which is providing 18 talented Australian women with the opportunity to take their careers to the next level by supporting executive education at internationally acclaimed business schools.
